Why is R.E. Important?

We are a school that believes that RE is a vitally important component of children's personal, social and spiritual development. Developing an understanding of our own and others' worldviews, traditions and celebrations, underpins the growth of empathy and respect. We encourage children to share their experiences of religion and celebrate their own beliefs. There are many lessons and qualities that are taught through the religions we explore, that support our school values and the children in developing their sense of identity and belonging.

In addition to R.E lessons, the children take part in regular assemblies led by Rev. Jo and festivals/services such as Christingle, Easter, Harvest & Remembrance. During singing assemblies, the children get the opportunity to learn, sing and explore religious songs that reflect their learning. The school also supports many charitable events including The Food Bank.
