
The Modern Foreign Language taught at Bartons is French. Children in Key Stage 2 learn French weekly, through an interactive programme. They will hear the language, speak it and eventually write it using a multi-sensory approach to learning.

The units taught include some conversational French as well as vocabulary and learning about France and French culture. Some units are linked to the class topics and so build another layer of knowledge.





Why is it important?

Learning a new language can unlock many opportunities for us. We can make links with other cultures and enjoy new experiences when we know a bit more about them. It is a great way for a class to bond, learning something new together and sharing their own experiences of different languages and ways of life. It allows native English speakers to empathise with those who have English as an additional language. It can also consolidate our own knowledge of the English language by teaching grammatical terms in a different context.
