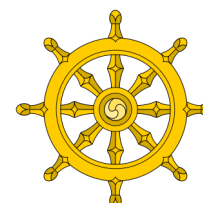
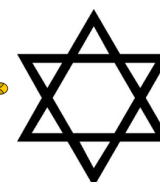




Bartons Primary School's R.E Vision
